Chairman's Column

The compressed season of major events in the south has led to a busy few weeks for the committed orienteer. From mid-January onwards, only the heavy snow in early February disturbed the succession of Regional events, culminating with the British Championship weekend.

It was great to see the numbers of WIM members running over the weekend at the British, especially the huge numbers of relay teams we managed to field. I can't remember when we last put out three junior teams and the atmosphere around the club tent as we cheered each WIM finisher was fantastic. Hilary Pickering worked very hard to manage all the team entries and and I'm sure you will join me in thanking her for all her hard work.

A fortnight earlier we had held our annual regional event at Gore Heath and the WIM team ethic was again very obvious. Gore Heath is quite a small area, but has some very complex contours and the Branford family's decision to stage the event as a Middle Distance race, rather than a conventional event, was fully justified. Everyone except the youngest juniors were kept off the tracks and paths and found themselves having to navigate carefully for the entire length of their courses. Every person I spoke to afterwards was full of praise for the course planning of Chris Branford and John Shucksmith's organisation worked like clockwork. The facilities of Sandford Middle School were much appreciated. Our thanks too to the many WIM members who put in a shift helping at the event.

As is usual when we hold events in the western side of our patch, the attendance is down on an event in the New Forest. Perhaps with the British in the offing and the perceived course distances being apparently on the short side, some people gave themselves the day off. Those who did missed a treat.

The next major event for the club is the regional round of the CompassSport Trophy, on an area near Exeter once used for the JK relays, which has been brought forward to mid March onto the date vacated when the British Relay Championships was brought forward by a fortnight. The club will again pay entry fees and we hope to see as many members as possible competing.

There has still been time for small scale local events though. There have been three Saturday events recently, which have been Dorset Schools League events and also informal events for adults. All have attracted attendances of around 100 and have been very enjoyable. Clearly there is a local market for such events. We are working hard with our neighbouring clubs to co-ordinate these events as part of a coherent local programme.

The WIM contribution to all this was the very successful (if very cold) Inside Park 3-in -1 event, masterminded by Trevor Bridle, with a schools event on the Saturday afternoon sandwiched between a MTBO event in the morning and the annual Night Owl night event. Some folk even did all three events.

We did have a nasty scare when we discovered the previous day that the shooting tenant was unaware of our presence at the weekend and had organised his last shoot of the season for the Saturday morning. A bit of lateral thinking and some last minute replanning meant that cyclists and shooters were able to avoid each other and both activities went ahead safely on the morning.

Finally, our congratulations must go to members Mike Kite and Mary Buckland, who got married in mid February, and to former member Tim Britton, now of BOK, who announced his engagement to fellow orienteer Laura Pearson on the weekend of the Gore Heath event.

Moors Valley Permanent Course – Ringing the changes

The Permanent Course in Moors Valley has now been in use for almost 10 years, and as a result there have been many changes both in the vegetation and the path network, so WIM decided last year that it needed an update.

The map has been re-surveyed, redrawn and is about to be printed, supported by East Dorset District Council. The number of posts has been increased from 45 to 50 all of which have been painted and now have S/I clips attached. The Forestry Commission has supplied and installed all the new posts, and I would like to thank Justin Rylands and his team for all their hard work over the past weeks. The posts are 1.5m long and take a bit of lifting across rough ground. Because of changes in the vegetation several posts have been relocated so that the Permanent Course can serve both Orienteers on foot and Mountain Bike enthusiasts,so if you are a regular user of the Permanent course you'll need a new map.

Although the course will be up and running by Easter WIM are going to put on a 'Re-Launch Day' on Saturday May 16 when we hope to offer a wide variety of activities for both beginners and experienced orienteers. Details will be out soon so keep an eye out for them.

British Championships 2009

This year the 'British' came to us, taking place on Hampton Ridge and at Beaulieu and enjoyed superb early spring weather, encouraging quite a few 'first time' club members to take part in the premier O event of the year.

Despite a long hike from the car park the beautifully sited and sheltered assembly area was buzzing with atmosphere with over 40 members joining some 1800 competitors from all over the country in the Individual event. Fast running across open heathland was the order of the day with Sophie Lawrence winning her class, Rebecca Whittingham coming a brilliant 2nd in W12B and Mark Bentley, Jo Pickering, Hilary Pickering and Nikki Crawford all coming 3rd in their class.

The Relays at Beaulieu were one of the great days out for WIM with no less than 15 teams taking part thanks to the masterly team management of Hilary Pickering. With the club tent in a prime position with a superb view of the run in our coaches did their stuff, encouraging and calming the juniors as they waited for their mass start. The forest and heath were good relay terrain glowing in the sunshine and excitement reached fever pitch as Rebecca Whittingham, our first leg runner in the Mini Relay powered her way up the finish lane to hand over to Fraser Smith. He in turn had a good run and handed over to Diggory Turner, a late recruit to the team who flew round the course picking up several places to bring the team home in 6 th place out of 21 teams, a brilliant performance. In the Senior competition WIM achieved an outstanding 3rd place in the M/W 60 class with Keith Henderson, Nikki Crawford and Chris Branford holding off a further 43 teams. At the club tent an enthusiastic crowd roared support at incoming runners with WIM really coming to life as a club. It's always difficult to know who to pick out after the first three places but in the Womens Short, Kirsty Staunton, Jo Pickering and Michelle Spillar achieved an outstanding 5thplace in the highly competitive class.

Surprising everyone by reappearing very quickly he was cheered up the run in by WIM spectators. Not only had he completed the course, he had taken the team up four places as well! We look forward to watching all the juniors develop their orienteering skills and hope they will be back next year for more!

In the adult teams we had a further nine team members who had never run an orienteering relay before and some who, due to the way courses are set, had to run harder courses than they had ever run before. They coped admirably and really added to the club spirit during the day. Due to injury (we wish Sue Hands a speedy recovery) three teams had late changes, Anne McMurty stepping in and running a day after getting back from Scotland, with Jose Stanley and Nikki Crawford changing teams as well. Nikki was now running with Chris Branford and Keith Henderson and our congratulations go to them for securing the bronze medals. A great run!

Thank you to everyone who turned out and we look forward to the next turnout for the club, the Compass Sport Trophy.

Congratulations to John and Di who were presented with the 2008 award for 'Outstanding Services to Schools Orienteering' at the British Championships 2009.

Their work in promoting schools O in Dorset is remarkable, originating almost 20 years ago when John joined the Dorset Outdoor Education Centre in Weymouth,in part to further his enthusiasm for sailing. Di joined him a little later and together they developed an interschool orienteering league amongst the primary schools of Weymouth.

They are charismatic people who can motivate both children and adults which has led them not only to work with children but to train teachers in Orienteering skills and in John's case become one of the leading Assessors of teachers and aspiring Orienteering coaches in the south of England.

Several years ago Di embarked on a mammoth project to produce O maps of Dorset Schools. To date she has produced no less than 160 maps which is truly incredible! In so doing she has developed close links with schools allowing them both to extend the ideas that they pioneered in Weymouth to the rest of the county. The concept of a 'pyramid' of primary schools round a larger secondary school enabled children to learn the skills of Orienteering in their own school and then compete in a league with other schools in the group where to be successful you actually had to read a map!

A successful bid for a Lottery grant, led by John and Di allowed WIM to purchase several sets of electronic timing equipment, there now being 3 schools sets in Dorset.

Electronic timing is a great motivator for children and school 'Pyramids' are currently being established in Dorchester, Gillingham, Shaftesbury, Sturminster Newton, Wimborne & Ferndown, Christchurch, Bridport and Beaminster. The longest established and most successful to date is the Purbeck group where Adrian Mitchell regularly brings a minibus full of children to local events.

John and Di have always been keen to develop a route that will allow youngsters to progress from school into the full competitive world of Orienteering and as part of this WIM established the Dorset Schools League. This brings in our other major player in Schools O ,Dick Keighley, himself a recipient of the award for Outstanding Services to Schools Orienteering in 2006. Dick was the prime mover in establishing the Schools League which now has three events per term plus the Score Championships in May at Moors Valley. As most of you know the Schools League events now combine coaching and an Informal event for adult orienteers so forming a bridge between 'enclosed' schools events and the wider world of club O events.

The award to Di and John happily coincided with the British Relays at Beaulieu at which WIM fielded 15 teams 3 of which were juniors. Not only did the juniors enjoy themsleves in the exciting atmosphere of the premier relay of the year but they showed that they could compete with the best in the country! As a club we should be proud of our juniors and grateful to John,Di, Dick and all our coaches who have worked so hard to achieve this success. Long may it continue!
